

March 15 meeting guest speaker is Julianne Cumming who will be sharing her experiences and pictures of droving cattle from low land pasture to the high country in Australia. "My family had done this for 3 generations to the Victorian Alps, or if you will, "Man From Snowy River Country". We had a 35,000acre lease, built our hut above the snow line, and each year in early December we would gather the cows and calves at the front gate and then spend 5 days on horse back riding the stock trails and droving our cattle to the High Country." Julianne also owns Jac's Journeys through which she has organized agricultural, Reiki and specialized group tours.

Bring a lunch as we will stop half way out on the trail. Please note this is a walking ride with no dogs allowed and no one is in charge of guiding. This is just a way for members to meet up with one another to trail ride.

The Board is coordinating this major promotional event differently this year by offering to pay 1-4 ATRA members with clinic credits or cash to set up and attend the booth. We need someone to pick up from the ATRA trailer and set up the display items on Thursday (must be set up by a specified time in the evening, usually 8 pm, set up takes about 2 hours) for \$150. It would be preferable it the same person takes down on Sunday as well. ## **Overnight Camping Rides 2018**

What to Bring for your Horse for overnight rides: saddle, cinch, saddle bags, breastplate and crouper, 2 saddle pads, grooming kit, horse first aid supplies, halters & long lead shanks, high line rope, rain sheet/blanket (it gets cold at night & horses can't move much to keep warm), feed tub, water bucket, helmet (optional, but ATRA recommends), horse fly spray, sponge, scraper and small bucket, manure tubs and forks or shovels to take manure to pit, hobbles (optional for lunch grazing only), easy boot (in case you lose a shoe – note most horses need a size bigger than shoe size), tag with phone # on halter (in case you lose your horse)

What to Bring for you for overnight rides (suggestions): personal clothing and toiletries, TP, bug spray, first aid kit, medicine, binoculars, camera, batteries, rain gear, winter jacket, chair, flashlight, garbage bags to haul out garbage, multi-tool, bell or whistle, bear spray, duct tape, compass or GPS, folding saw, pocket knife, axe, sewing kit, tarp, cooking supplies and food and drinks, lunch kit, generator. Medical information card that has name, next of kin & phone # & relationship to, location of truck/trailer keys, AHC#, medications, allergies, medical conditions or any health concerns (ATRA has these so ask trail ride organizer on the day you arrive)

These trips are for ATRA members, with their own horse, trailer & camping accommodations. Horses and riders should have trail riding experience and be fit enough for 4-8 hour day rides. We recommend all horses have 4 shoes prior to coming to mountains, as there is lots of rock on many of the trails. Non-mountain rides (Cypress Hills and weekend rides) shoes not required. If you are using boots instead, make sure you fit and practice with them ahead. Make sure your horse can handle saddle bags, rain slickers, creeks, mud, bogs, dogs and wildlife. Also make sure your truck has enough power and trailer has working brakes for the steep hills. Trails in these areas range from easy flat valley rides to high steep mountainous areas. There are many beautiful trails, some hard to find and not well marked, so if you haven't been there before, this is a great opportunity to come with the group, who can show you the trails. We tend to split up and ride out in various smaller groups to different destinations. Unless noted, there is no limit on number of members that can attend. We do ask that you **REGISTER** with contact or sign up at a spring meeting so we know you are coming and can send additional information on group activities, meals travel and directions to destinations. The ATRA banner will be displayed at our campsite. Unless noted, most campgrounds are free and have no water, RV hook-ups or power. There is no cell phone service at any campgrounds. BYO cubes preferably, as hay can introduce weeds to the area. At free campgrounds, facilities include outhouses (BYO TP), high-line poles (BYO rope). You can tie or panel beside your trailer. No electric fences or grazing.

May Long Weekend Camping Trip to Wierenga Pastures, Fort Assiniboine May 18 – 21. Henry and Marg Wierenga welcome ATRA to their Pastures for our Annual May Long Group Camp and Ride. Facility offers: Water for horses, pumped from fresh water creek on premise to large holding tank. NO POWER or HORSE PENS so you'll need to bring panels or electric fencing or high line rope for high lining between trees or trailers. Another option is to trailer tie. There are three outhouses, fire pit spots, a large gazebo that has an open fire pit in center and drop down sides for the chilly weather. Also available for rent is a couple of cabins/trailers – Reservations will need to be confirmed promptly. Cost is \$30/person for the weekend. # **Overnight Camping Rides 2018 continued**

June 25-July 2 Hummingbird Maintenance Mountain Camping. The equestrian campground is 100km SW of Rocky Mountain House. Take Hwy 752 (60km, 40 paved/20 gravel), south west of Rocky to the Forestry Trunk Road 734, turn right (west) at that T-intersection (41km to camp). After crossing the South Ram Riversteep hill, the road turns west for a mile or so then goes north. Look



for the Hummingbird sign on the west side. Turn left and follow the road to the staging area. Continue on the road past the information signs in the first parking lot (day use area). The road climbs a short hill then makes a sharp u turn across a small creek then continues west. The equestrian loop camping area has a sign and an entrance, on the left (south). Group will do day rides most days and likely one campground cleanup day. Please plan to help with picking up garbage and clearing trails if you come on this trip. ATRA has adopted the Allenby trail for cleanup and unless the road washes out or fires keep us away, we will go, rain or shine. Fuel costs may be partially reimbursed to those that submit receipts to Shirley

# July 16-21 East Drummond Creek Trail Relocation at Whitehorse Creek Campground 60km South of Hinton. 4km West of Hinton turn

South on Hwy 40 for ~50km. Turn right at T and its 5km past Cadomin. All the equestrian sites are reserved so you must sign up with Ken to get a site. They cost \$11/night + \$2/horse/night. Sites have tie stalls or box stalls (not covered so bring rain sheets or tarps/bungies) and bring manure forks and muck buckets. Outhouses and firewood are provided, no hookups. The group will be clearing the overgrown Drummond Creek trail. Ken will use the trail clearing criteria to choose crew from the sign up list based on required skills. Members not involved in the trail clearing are invited to come, ride the area and socialize around the campfire if extra campsites are available. July 22-29 Cypress Hills Saskatchewan West Block Campground West Block is 50 km SW of Maple Creek via Hwy 271. About 7 hours from Edmonton. This first come-basis campground has horse corrals so we will call the day before we plan to leave to make sure there is space. Cubes/pellets only permitted (no hay!). This area offers wide open spaces with lush coulees, forests of lodgepole pine and white spruce and spectacular vistas with panoramic views. This area is remote with no cellular service or power, but does provide firewood, drinking water and picnic tables. Camping fees are \$20/night/site including horses. **Aug 30-Sept 3 (Long Weekend) Drayton Valley Riverside Trails.** Come ride along the Pembina River. No shoes required. Great training area with Bridges and river crossing. Sept 7-14 Panther Wilderness Trail Development Ride. The Staging Area for the trip is the Panther Public Land Recreation Area 80km SW of Sundre on Coal Camp Road and West of the Mountainaire Lodge. The group is planning to go 10 miles into Panther Corners with wagons and on horseback, setup a base camp then complete the balance of the re-establishment of the Dormer Ridge Trail, do an Assessment of what should be done to the Dormer River Trail from the Panther River to the Banff Park Boundary, possibly complete the clearing of that trail, clear deadfall/overgrowth from trails in and around Panther Corners, and do some riding/exploring. The trail clearing criteria will be used to choose crew from sign up list based on required skills. Casino funds cannot be used for food so there will be a cost for groceries. Volunteers may be partially reimbursed for fuel costs if they submit receipts to Shirley by the Sept meeting. **Sunday:** Cattle drive, starts at 10am, lunch & dinner provided, all day ride, moving several groups of cows, with farm wranglers. 

#### April 20-22 GPS/Mapping Courses at South Cooking Lake Seniors Center

COURSE INSTRUCTOR: Dugald Dunlop, B.Sc. After spending 10 years in the mineral exploration industry Dugald has spent the last 24 years applying his training and experience to computer mapping in a broad range of Recreational, Tourism, Forestry, Fish & Wildlife and Natural Resource based applications. He has been using GPS since 1994 and is Resource Inventory Committee certified as a GPS Data Processor/Project Manager. Dugald is currently a partner in the Vernon and Nanaimo B.C. based mapping company Meridian Mapping. The Company offer services in GPS Training, GPS Surveys, Terrain Mapping/Modeling, GIS Projects, Data Mgmt and more.

As a Prerequisite to the Clinics you should have taken the MEC GPS & Map/Compass Free Classes (GPS Units Supplied). A limited number of GPS units will be available for use in this course so owning a GPS unit would helpful but please do not buy a unit for this course. Participants should bring their own GPS, manual, spare batteries, compass. For both clinics bring clothing and footwear to spend 2-3 hours in the field. Bring notepaper, highlighter, pens and a bag lunch. 2 Day Clinic Bring your laptop and cable to connect your GPS if you have one.

Friday-1 Day "Using Your Handheld GPS" - & Map Reading/Navigation": The course is designed to teach GPS basics in terrestrial applications, enabling users to get the most from their unit. The agenda will include basic theory and terminology of the GPS system, and an intro to mapping concepts such as scale, projections, and coordinate systems along with basic compass navigation. Theory will also include GPS field techniques, a review of accuracy expectations and limitations. The agenda will include field exercises to practice GPS techniques. The day will conclude in the classroom with a comparison of the features /capabilities of various brands and models and a demo of available software and data that provide added functionality.

Saturday & Sunday-2Day "Using Your Handheld GPS - & OziExplorer GPS Software/ Garman Software/Waypoint & Track Mgmt/Navigation+: The GPS portion of this clinic will cover all of the topics of the one day clinic and expand on them. The mapping portion will primarily be focused on the OziExplorer Software for mapping purposes, however other Software will be covered such as Garman's Map Source, PDF/Avenza Maps App. If time permits, how to use Google Earth with respect to waypoints/tracks with also be included.

As a Prerequisite you should have taken both of the MEC GPS and Map/Compass Free Classes (They supply GPS Units), taken the ATRA Friday Clinic the day Prior or be comfortable using a GPS and Navigating by Map. This Course is the basis of the Boreal Wilderness Institute's Wilderness Survival Programme. It is world class training that provides the knowledge and confidence you need.

Practical survival techniques are emphasized along with how to mentally prepare yourself for surviving in the wilderness.

Topics Include; Introduction to Survival, Survival Physiology & Psychology, Clothing & Sleeping Bags, Fire Lighting, Shelter Building, Emergency Signals, Critical Survival Items, Preparing to Survive, & Learning from Others.

Each Participant Receives a copy of Bruce's survival book.

<u>Day 2 - Summer Field Session (SFS)</u> takes you beyond the classroom and into the Boreal Forest. The SFS gives you the chance to practice summer survival skills in relaxed hands-on learning atmosphere. This gives you the chance to practice the wilderness survival skills discussed in the SCS. Participants will learn how to build a Cooking Fire, Stick Burners for Cooking and a Summer Survival Shelter.
